Lectio Divina

READ: The two disciples who encountered the risen Christ on their way to Emmaus joined the other disciples. Jesus appeared in their midst. The disciples were afraid and thought they were seeing a ghost. Jesus showed them his hands and feet, explaining that a ghost does not have flesh and bones. The disciples were overjoyed yet could not fully believe due to their astonishment. Jesus asked for something to eat. They gave him a piece of broiled fish. He ate it before their very eves. Then Jesus reminded them of what he told them about the Messiah, the preaching repentance and of the witnessing by the disciples.

REFLECT: Jesus' glorified body has flesh and bones. This conveys that the reality of the resurrection is far more than what we can imagine. What appears very interesting in today's Gospel is that it narrates that the risen Christ ate a piece of broiled fish. This entails that Jesus' glorified body was nourished by a piece of broiled fish. A more profound implication is that the gift of the natural world will be part of the world to come. It is worth reflecting that creation is included in God's salvific plan and act. There is more in the reality of the resurrection than just seeing a ghost. We believe that we shall have glorified bodies in a whole new world.

PRAY: Let us pray for the ecological conversion of everyone.

ACT: Let us do one concrete action for the care of our common home.

WHAT THE FIRST READING SAYS TO ME

This passage is the first of six major sermons in Acts. All of these six sermons deal with the substance of the Christian message. It is: "Dying you destroyed our death, rising you restored our life. Lord Jesus, come in glory" (2nd Memorial Acclamation at Mass). Peter's citation from Psalm 16 illustrates the freedom with which the early Church made use of the Hebrew Bible. The Psalm describes God as saving his chosen ones from destruction. Peter applies this to God's chosen one par excellence, Jesus Christ, and brings out his point: God raised up Jesus from the dead according to his "set plan and foreknowledge."

WHAT THE SECOND READING SAYS TO ME

The writer describes Christ's death and its salutary effect on us in terms of the Jewish Passover: sojourn in a strange land and deliverance by the blood of a spotless Passover lamb. We are still in a strange land, but we are delivered by Christ our Passover Sacrifice. For final deliverance from pain and evil, we have "faith and hope... in God."

WHAT THE GOSPEL SAYS TO ME

This story is one of the most beautifully written by Luke and it offers a wealth of theological (religious) insight. God's word should be "burning within" us as often as we meditatively read it at home and listen to it in church. Meeting the Lord Jesus in the breaking of bread (the Eucharistic celebration) should open our eyes ever more! "Lord Jesus, open the Scriptures to us; make our hearts burn while you speak to us" (Gospel Acclamation).

KNOW YOUR CHURCH

A video experience of the Eucharist might have value if it makes people hunger for the real thing, but as an alternative for showing up to church, it is the ecclesial equivalent of substituting a cooking channel for a dinner with family or friends.

It is time for the church to tell priests to stop broadcasting the Eucharist.

Prior to the pandemic, watching the Mass on television was a rarity, limited to EWTN customers and the occasional major papal ceremony. Regular broadcasts were principally aimed at shut-ins and the sick. I support continuing limited broadcasting to such parishioners as long as they are brought Communion from the parish Mass they had watched online.

During the pandemic, it was difficult, if not impossible, to celebrate the Eucharist in parishes because of the fear of contagion. In many places public health officials told people, especially the elderly, to stay home rather than risk the possibility of infection. One pastoral response to the pandemic was to make the Eucharist available for watching online.

But we have become so accustomed to online Eucharists that they are viewed as normal and appropriate. Many parishes continue to stream the Eucharist live even though the pandemic has passed. With the streaming equipment already installed, the cost is minimal. Pastors, meanwhile, don't want to give up the online donations.

And the momentum is likely to continue. If not banned, remotely observed Eucharists may become even more common as the church's way of dealing with a shortage of priests.

Taking online Eucharists to their logical conclusion, people could try to receive Communion from the comfort of home. Bread and wine could be put in front of the screen, and the priest could consecrate them from afar. If God is powerful enough to change the bread and wine when it is on the altar a short distance from the priest, isn't God powerful enough to do it at a distance of thousands of miles? Miracles don't require proximity.
