Lectio Divina

READ: Jesus returned to his own country. On a Sabbath, he taught in the synagogue. The people who heard him were astonished at his teaching. But these same people who heard him were asking where did Jesus get his wisdom and how was he able to do the miracles he performed. The people also identified Jesus to be the carpenter and the Son of Mary. The people took offense at him. Jesus said that prophets are not received in their own country. Consequently, Jesus did not perform many miracles there. Jesus only laid his hands on few sick people in order to heal them. Jesus was surprised at their lack of faith.

REFLECT: Our ongoing conversion happens in the ordinariness of our everyday life. In our faith journey, there are times when we tend to associate God's presence in the extraordinary events. But God reveals himself even in the most ordinary event of our daily life. In the Gospel passage for today, Jesus returned to his own country. On a Sabbath, he taught in the synagogue where the people who heard him were astonished. However, despite their astonishment, they took offense at Jesus because they looked at Jesus as an ordinary person in their Like the people in neighborhood. today's Gospel, it seems that we find it difficult to feel God's presence in the ordinary events.

PRAY: We pray that we may truly feel God's presence even in the ordinary events of our daily life.

ACT: Let us give our best to whatever we do today while finding God amidst the ordinary.

SAINT OF THE DAY - JULY 9th

Saint Augustine Zhao Rong

Augustine Zhao Rong was a Chinese soldier who accompanied Bishop John Gabriel Taurin Dufresse of the Paris Foreign Mission Society to his martyrdom in Beijing. Not long after his baptism, Augustine was ordained as a diocesan priest. He was martyred in 1815.

Father Augustine, whose name is attached to today's memorial, was the first native-born Chinese priest and the first Chinese priest to be martyred. He was originally a soldier entrusted with the task of transporting to Beijing French Bishop John Gabriel Taurin Dufresse who had been arrested and would also be martyred. During the long journey, the bishop greatly impressed Zhao Rong with his kindness and peaceful demeanor in the face of persecution. Zhao Rong requested and received baptism after learning about the Catholic faith. Taking the name Augustine, he was later ordained a priest. After his arrest, he was offered the opportunity to renounce the Catholic faith but refused. After horrific tortures. Father Augustine died of his injuries in prison.

SAINT OF THE DAY - JULY 11th

St. Benedict

St. Benedict (born c. 480 CE, Nursia [Italy]—died c. 547, Monte Cassino; feast day July 11, formerly March 21) was t h e founder the Benedictine monastery at Monte Cassino and father Western monasticism; the Rule that he established became the norm for monastic living throughout Europe. In 1964, in view of the work of monks following the Benedictine Rule in the evangelization and civilization of so many European countries in the Middle Ages, Pope Paul VI proclaimed him the patron saint of all Europe.

WHAT THE FIRST READING SAYS TO ME

The prophet is God's spokesman, sent specifically by him. Ezekiel is sent as a prophet to his compatriots, a people "hard of face and obstinate of heart." He is told to preach the message "whether they heed or resist." Not an easy task! Many prophets have had to suffer. Think of Jeremiah, Isaiah, Amos, John the Baptist and modern prophet-like personages. And our Lord himself was no exception, as we will see in the Gospel.

WHAT THE SECOND READING SAYS TO ME

Paul encounters problems similar to those of Ezekiel (First Reading) and Jesus himself (Gospel). "False preachers" have confused the congregation of Corinth. They have bragged about supposedly having received extraordinary revelations from God, Paul, on the contrary, will boast of nothing except his physical situation, which is miserable: "I will rather boast most gladly of my weaknesses, in order that the power of Christ may dwell with me." He thus invites his converts to see in him Christ whom he represents. God's word to us is: We should do the same wherever people preach the word of God.

WHAT THE GOSPEL SAYS TO ME

Jesus is shown as being unable to accomplish much in his hometown because of the people's lack of faith. Why does Mark recount this tradition? He has no intention of entertaining us. Guided by God, he wants to teach his word. It may be as follows: Without faith it is impossible to be aware of the truth and the sacred in our midst. A child, a hobo, a neighbor, a coworker, any person even without formal education can teach us the truth. Do we accept it? Faith is of the utmost importance when we are listening to our priest.

Vatican City — July 2, 2024

Pope: Heaven is for 'everyone, everyone, everyone' -

Heaven is not a secure vault protected from outsiders but a "hidden treasure" that is reached by cultivating virtues, Pope Francis said. Before praying the Angelus in St. Peter's Square on the feast of Sts. Peter and Paul June 29, the pope reflected on Jesus giving St. Peter, the first pope, the keys to the kingdom of heaven. "The mission that Jesus entrusts to Peter is not that of barring the doors to the house, permitting entry only to a few select guests, but of helping everyone to find the way to enter, in faithfulness to the Gospel of Jesus," Francis said after celebrating Mass in St. Peter's Basilica. Heaven, he added, is "for everyone. Everyone, everyone, everyone can enter." The pope said that St. Peter "received the keys to the kingdom not because he was perfect, no, he is a sinner, but because he was humble, honest and the Father had given him sincere faith." after many trials and setbacks, the Apostle Peter was the first to experience for himself "the joy and freedom that come from meeting the Lord," and the first "to understand that authority is a service in order to open the door to The following day, Francis Jesus." again appeared in the window of the Apostolic Palace to keep his usual Sunday appointment of praying the Angelus with the faithful. He focused on the Gospel theme of inclusivity by reflecting on the day's Gospel reading from St. Mark in which a woman is healed after touching Jesus' cloak and a girl is resurrected after Jesus took her by the hand. Highlighting the importance of physical contact in both healings, the pope asked, "Why is this physical contact important?" "It is because these two women are considered impure and cannot, therefore, be physically touched — one because she suffers from bleeding and the other because she is dead," he said. "Yet, Jesus allows Himself to be touched and is not afraid to touch." By carrying out the physical healing, Jesus "challenges the false religious belief that God separates the pure, placing them on one side, from the impure on another," the pope said. "Instead, God does not make this kind of separation because we are all his children."
