Lectio Divina

READ: The disciples returned from their mission. They reported to Jesus all that they had done and taught. Jesus invited his disciples to go off into a remote place so that they could rest. Jesus knew that the apostles did not even have time to eat because they were attending to the needs of many people. However, many people still followed them and some even arrived in the place on foot ahead of them. When Jesus was coming ashore, he saw a huge crowd. He had compassion on them for they were like sheep without a shepherd. Jesus taught them many things.

REFLECT: The human Jesus was aware of the human limitations of attending to other people's need. He knew that his disciples also needed some rest. The disciples had returned from their mission. Jesus planned together with his disciples to find a place where they could get some rest and recreation. The plan was for them to rest. But some even arrived ahead of them in the place where they were heading. There was a big crowd gathered in the place. Jesus had compassion with them so He taught them, perhaps having forgone the plan to rest. Jesus and the disciples must have discerned that there was an immediate need before them and that they could not simply close their eyes and turn their backs from the people who needed them.

PRAY: We pray that God make us more compassionate.

ACT: After attending the Eucharist today, let us do one compassionate act.

WHAT THE FIRST READING SAYS TO ME

Jeremiah attributes the woes that beset Israel (defeat and deportation) to lack of leadership. The kings of Judah, shepherds in the name of God, have failed in tending the flock. Remember that in Biblical thought the king was the Supreme Shepherd's vicegerent on earth. Where he fails, disaster follows. But Jeremiah foresees an ideal king to come. He will be a righteous shoot of David (of the dynasty of the great King David). He shall govern wisely and do what is just and right in the land. The early Church saw this vision ultimately fulfilled in God's ideal vicegerent, the Lord Jesus, a shepherd who really cares.

WHAT THE SECOND READING SAYS TO ME

Paul teaches that Jews and Gentiles were brought together by Christ. It is he "who made both [Jews and Gentiles] one and broke down the dividing wall of enmity." He abolished the law (all the rules of the rabbis) to create one new man from us, who follows the great universal law of love for God and neighbor on which "the whole law [is based]" (Mt 22:40). Why do we read this passage, which deals with an issue (Jews and Gentiles) of 2,000 years ago? Perhaps the Bible with God as author wants to question us about a current similar issue. Can people of a different race feel welcome in your congregation, or do they go home with the feeling that they were just politely tolerated?

WHAT THE GOSPEL SAYS TO ME

The image of shepherd entails first of all the idea of ruling, but it also implies the notion of feeding and providing. In the Sunday liturgy, the Lord Jesus shepherds by teaching his word during the Liturgy of the Word, and by "[spreading] the table" before us during the Liturgy of the Eucharist. Jesus still has compassion for any vast crowd that is like sheep without a shepherd, but he has only us to show this. Do we make everyone, especially visiting strangers, feel at home in our congregation? Does your congregation have a committee of members to welcome strangers? What about your handshake of peace? What is done to give young members a feeling of belonging? Your parish council could look into this.

KNOW YOUR CHURCH

Vance, Donald Trump's newly announced running mate in the 2024 election, has a chance to become the United States' second Catholic vice president. Vance is the second-youngest member of the U.S. Senate. He took office in 2023. He was baptized and confirmed in the Catholic Church at the age of 35 at St. Gertrude's, a Dominican priory in In a 2020 article in The Cincinnati. Lamp titled "On Mamaw and Becoming Catholic," Vance reflected on his conversion as a process that occurred "slowly and unevenly" over several According to Vance, his years. gradual journey to the faith was inspired by the example of his grandmother, "Mamaw," whom he describes as "a woman of deep, but completely de-institutionalized, faith." After growing up in a poor Appalachian home, serving four years in the Marines, and earning a law degree from Yale, Vance says he considered himself an atheist. Despite defying the odds of his humble upbringing and rising through the economic and social ranks, Vance said he was not happy with his state in life, and he began developing an inclination toward Christianity and Catholicism in particular. I began to wonder: Were all these worldly markers of success actually making me a better person? I had traded virtue for achievement and found the latter wanting," he wrote. "There was a voice in my head that demanded better of me." "I felt desperate for a worldview that understood our bad behavior as simultaneously social and individual, structural and moral; that recognized that we are products of our that environment; we have a responsibility to change environment, but that we are still moral beings with individual duties; one that could speak against rising rates of divorce and addiction, not as sanitized conclusions about their negative social externalities, but with moral outrage.' More than any political philosophy, Vance wrote that he soon realized that this worldview he had been looking for was one he had long known: "It was my Mamaw's Christianity."
