Lectio Divina

READ: John told Jesus that they saw someone driving out demons in Jesus' name. The disciples tried to forbid the man because he did not belong to their group. Jesus told them that whoever was not against them was for them. Jesus also told them that anyone who would give his disciples a drink of water because they belonged to Christ would surely be rewarded. Jesus also taught them about the fate of the one who would cause the little ones believing in him to stumble and sin - that such individual be thrown into the sea. Jesus also said that if the hand of the disciple would cause him to sin, it would be better to cut it off in order to enter into life than with two hands to go to hell.

REFLECT: Even the disciples of Jesus at that time were tempted to see their ministry in a very narrow and myopic manner. In today's Gospel, John reported to Jesus that they tried to stop someone who was driving out demons in Jesus' name. They tried to prevent this person because he did not belong to their group. John even seemed to take pride in what they did. Jesus corrected their myopic way of understanding their ministry.

October 4: Saint Francis of Assisi— Memorial - 1182–1226

Patron Saint of animals, ecologists, families, lacemakers, merchants, needleworkers, peace, and zoos Invoked against dying alone and fire - Canonized by Pope Gregory IX on July 16, 1228

One of the Church's beloved saints, Francis of Assisi, was likely born in 1181 in Assisi, about 100 miles north of Rome. Born into the merchant class, the lively youth enjoyed parties, singing, and being the center of attention. He showed only disinterest in joining his father as a silk merchant.

Francis dreamed of doing great things, chiefly to become a knight. In 1202—fitted with fine armor, a sword, and a horse—Francis was sent into battle against the town of Perugia. Success would prepare him to become a Crusader in the pope's army, but the short battle ended with his capture and imprisonment. Francis suffered captivity for a year until his father paid the ransom for his release; when freed, he spent months battling a serious illness. Francis' imprisonment and illness led him to reevaluate his life. Even so, outfitted for another battle in the Count of Brienne's army in 1205, Francis had a vision that caused him to turn around, return to Assisi, and seek God's will for his life.

For a year, Francis prayed and sought God's will, while his father insisted that he become a knight or work in the family business. During that time, Francis grew in his love for the poor and served the lepers at a nearby hospital. While praying one day in the dilapidated Church of San Damiano, Francis heard a voice from Heaven say to him, "Go, repair my house which, as you see, is falling completely to ruin." With that, he began to physically repair that church, live in solitude, and pray continually.

In 1206, when Francis was twenty-five, he and his father formally parted ways in the presence of the Bishop of Assisi. Francis renounced his inheritance and began to live a life of poverty, prayer, and service of God. Most of the townspeople ridiculed Francis, believing he was out of his mind. But as time passed, Francis attracted followers. He and his followers spent much time praying, listening to the voice of God, serving the poor and lepers, and repairing abandoned churches.

WHAT THE FIRST READING SAYS TO ME

The "spirit" in this passage is not the Holy Spirit. It is a charism to prophesy, which is somehow related to God. Moses enjoyed this charism and shared it with the seventy elders. But this spirit was directly given to some others also. Joshua did not take it, which made Moses ask: "Are you jealous?"

As God's word to us, this tradition teaches that God's gifts are not limited to certain people only. It introduces the theme of the Gospel, which deals with the same issue.

WHAT THE SECOND READING SAYS TO ME

In this reading James has severe words of warning for the rich who exploit the poor. A generous Church contributor who sins against social justice in any form is a hypocrite. Underpaying domestics and soothing our consciences by giving them the leftovers of our food and some old clothes is a crime against justice. Since this sin too can be "hidden," pray with the psalmist of today: "Cleanse me from my unknown faults!".

WHAT THE GOSPEL SAYS TO ME

The spirit (charism) to expel demons was given to Jesus and his disciples first, but also to others. John did not like it and tried to stop one who had it from using it. Jesus said in reply: "Do not prevent him." We should learn to see God's Spirit at work wherever we meet good people. "For or against Jesus" does not necessarily follow Church-denomination lines, but acting honestly according to one's conscience. "Whoever is not against us is for us," be it often anonymously!

This does not blur the truth as we see it in the Catholic tradition; it simply recognizes that a ray of truth and much goodness are found everywhere. We should respect and love every conscientious person no matter how different he or she may be!

Open-Minded Respect and Love for All

It seems to be an inborn instinct to mistreat and disqualify people who are different from us. Let a bearded and long-haired youngster or a lady whose dress code is not ours appear and immediately eyebrows are raised! The more isolated life is, be it geographically in rural areas or socially by self-imposed isolation (the railroad dividing black and white sections of little towns in the South or the inner city versus the suburbs of the North), the more narrow-minded and biased people are, even to the extent of expelling the "outside agitator" and violently ostracizing him socially. This very thing happened to our Lord, who came to his own "but his own people did not accept him" (Jn 1:11).

He was different. In his home- town of Nazareth the people even became hostile. "They took offense at him" (Mk 6:3). Being a Jew, our Lord would be refused membership today in many a country club! Over the centuries, Christian denominations have isolated themselves socially. Small wonder then that they mistrust one another. An imprudent proselytism may have contributed to religious bias as it still exists in our country, though the ecumenical movement has done much good by trying to eliminate a "ghetto mentality" that has been with the Churches for a long time.

Today's Bible readings deal with this topic. Since bias (whether social, racial, or religious) is so subtle, we should check ourselves honestly and pray: "Cleanse me from my unknown faults!"
