Gospel Reflection:

The old Simeon and prophetess Anna recognize Jesus as the Messiah due to their pure eyes and simple faith. They live in prayer and accept the Father's will. allowing them to see the richness of new times. On the other hand, Mary accepts that God's love becomes the gifts of Jesus Christ, offered on the In Jesus, they both Cross. recognize God's presence and solidarity with everyone of us.

"For ... my eyes have seen your salvation."

Read: Christ is the glorious light of the world. The Lord is entering his Temple. He is recognized by Simeon and Anna, but his light and glory go unseen by most people.

Reflect: Imagine the scene of the crowds of people: the sacrifices, the smoke, the sounds, the smells. And amid all this commotion, two people enter with their baby boy. Perhaps there were others that day doing the same thing. And yet, when Mary and Joseph enter, carrying the baby Jesus, Simeon recognizes that this is the child he has been waiting for, and he cries to God in joy, "Now, O Lord, you can dismiss your servant in peace, for ... my eyes have seen your salvation." The long-awaited Saviour had arrived, but most eyes didn't spot him. Why did Simeon and Anna see him? Because they were dedicated to looking for him. They had consecrated their lives to God. and they were alert to the promptings of the Holy Spirit.

Pray: As Christ is consecrated wholly to his Father's will for our salvation, we offer ourselves to his service and to praise him for his mighty works.

Act: On this Day of Prayer for Consecrated Life, pray for more vocations and thank a religious sister or brother you know for their commitment to Christ.

WHAT THE FIRST READING SAYS TO ME

The prophet consoles his fellow citizens who are undergoing the disappointments of the reconstruction of their country after the Babylonian exile. The Lord will come! "My messenger," "the Lord," and the "the messenger of the covenant" stand for God. He comes to the temple. This passage introduces us to the theme of the Gospel, in which God, in the Lord Jesus, comes to the temple. The Lord will come refining and purifying, as the Lord Jesus destined for the fall and rise of many in Israel, a sign that will be opposed. Note that Malachi is not against sacrifices as such. He points out that a purified heart is the condition for offering a sacrifice (symbol of self) that pleases God. We should be aware of this when we participate in the sacrificial rites of the Eucharist.

WHAT THE SECOND READING SAYS TO ME

The author points to the fact that Jesus was fully man and as such able to be our high priest, mediator between God and humankind. He had to become like his brothers and sisters "in every way," and in his parents he observed the Jewish law of purification as described in today's Gospel.

WHAT THE GOSPEL SAYS TO ME

Luke describes the Jewish purification rite that the Holy Family observed as another manifestation of our Lord. He is introduced as "the Christ of the Lord," the Anointed King or Messiah, who meets two representatives of his people, Simeon and Anna. The words "he took him into his arms" denote the customary ritual for blessing children, while "you yourself [Mary] a sword will pierce" indicates the pain to be experienced by Mary as the mother of the Redeemer. Are you willing to accept our Lord as controversial? His values, do's and don'ts, are not always those of your friends and associates! Take a stand!

Saint of the Day - 17th January, 2025

Saint Blaise's Story

We know more about the devotion to Saint Blaise by Christians around the world than we know about the saint himself. His feast is observed as a holy day in some Eastern Churches. In 1222, the Council of Oxford prohibited servile labor in England on Blaise's feast day. The Germans and Slavs hold him in special honor, and for decades many United States Catholics have sought the annual Saint Blaise blessing for their throats.

We know that Bishop Blaise was martyred in his episcopal city of Sebastea, Armenia, in 316. The legendary Acts of St. Blaise were written 400 years later. According to them Blaise was a good bishop, working hard to encourage the spiritual and physical health of his people. Although the Edict of Toleration (311), granting freedom of worship in the Roman Empire, was already five years old, persecution still raged in Armenia. Blaise was apparently forced to flee to the back country. There he lived as a hermit in solitude and prayer, but he made friends with the wild animals. One day a group of hunters seeking wild animals for the amphitheater stumbled upon Blaise's cave. They were first surprised and then frightened. The bishop was kneeling in prayer surrounded by patiently waiting wolves, lions and bears.

The legend has it that as the hunters hauled Blaise off to prison, a mother came with her young son who had a fish bone lodged in his throat. At Blaise's command the child was able to cough up the bone.

Agricolaus, governor of Cappadocia, tried to persuade Blaise to sacrifice to pagan idols. The first time Blaise refused, he was beaten. The next time he was suspended from a tree and his flesh torn with iron combs or rakes. Finally, he was beheaded.

Reflection

Four centuries give ample opportunity for fiction to creep in with fact. Who can be sure how accurate Blaise's biographer was? But biographical details are not essential. Blaise is seen as one more example of the power those have who give themselves entirely to Jesus. As Jesus told his apostles at the Last Supper, "If you remain in me and my words remain in you, ask for whatever you want and it will be done for you" (John 15:7). With faith we can follow the lead of the Church in asking for Blaise's protection.
