Theme: The Servant of Yahweh -

Every time we discover a new aspect in one we love, we stop in wonderment. "I did not know him/her as such!" And this deeper insight and sharing in a person's self results in greater appreciation, intimacy, and love. Today we celebrate the Lord's baptism by John in the Jordan. Matthew relates Jesus' baptism as epiphany another (manifestation), declaring that the Lord Jesus is the Servant (Son) of Yahweh. His call in life is that of the Servant as depicted in today's First Reading.

LECTIO DIVINA



"Not Worth To Untie His Sandal"

Read: John the Baptist prepares the way for the Messiah, whose arrival is announced by heavenly sign and sound. As Jesus prays after baptism, he is revealed as God's Son, the One who will save the people and renew them with the fire of the Holy Spirit.

Reflect: The identity of John the Baptist and of Jesus are clarified in today's readings. John makes it clear that he is not the Messiah. He is the humble herald of the One who is to come, "not worthy to untie his sandal." As Jesus is baptized, his identity as Son and Saviour is confirmed by the Holy Spirit and God the Father. The Father is well pleased in his Son, who carries out his saving will. Our own identity as Christians is also tied to our Baptism and expressed in this great Sacrament. We are adopted as sons and daughters of God, as brothers and sisters of Christ and heirs to the Kingdom of God. God is well pleased with us, if we seek to do his will like, John the Baptist and Christ his Son.

Pray: Reflect upon your status as a beloved son or daughter of God and brother or sister of Christ.

Act: Find out the date of your Baptism and give thanks for such great a gift from God.



WHAT THE FIRST READING SAYS TO ME

Isaiah's central message is an announcement of salvation for the people of God. He reveals God as a Shepherd-King, attracting and ever caring for his people.

WHAT THE SECOND READING SAYS TO ME

Paul proclaims that the "grace of God has appeared" in Christ. This has set us on the road to salvation by giving us the gifts of God, especially Baptism, and by calling us to lead lives dedicated to Christ.

WHAT THE GOSPEL SAYS TO ME

"He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire": fire is a familiar biblical image that points to the presence of God. Here it could indicate the Holy Spirit's purifying and sanctifying activity at baptism. "Like a dove": Israel is often compared with a dove. Here it stands for the new Israel, the community founded by Jesus, and our Lord himself representing it. Luke has Jesus pray after his baptism, just as he has him pray often before important decisions in his life. This was an important moment in the life of Jesus, namely one in which he received a clear awareness of the great mission he had to accept. Pray often to the Holy Spirit for fidelity to your calling in life!

Reflection: John preached the Baptism of repentance for the coming of the Messiah. Iesus, being the Messiah, humbly accepts the baptism of John even though he was without sin and did not need to be baptized with John's baptism. This fact makes us think if Baptism is just the washing from sin or something more. Seeing what happened to Jesus when He prayed after His Baptism leads us to conclude that when we are baptized, we do not just become cleansed of sin but also become the "beloved children of God" by adoption.

Saint of the Day - 17th January, 2025

Saint Anthony of Egypt's Story

The life of Anthony will remind many people of Saint Francis of Assisi. At 20, Anthony was so moved by the Gospel message, "Go, sell what you have, and give to [the] poor" (Mark 10:21b), that he actually did just that with his large inheritance. He is different from Francis in that most of Anthony's life was spent in solitude. He saw the world completely covered with snares, and gave the Church and the world the witness of solitary asceticism, great personal mortification and prayer. But no saint is antisocial, and Anthony drew many people to himself for spiritual healing and guidance.

At 54, he responded to many requests and founded a sort of monastery of scattered cells. Again, like Francis, he had great fear of "stately buildings and well-laden tables."

At 60, he hoped to be a martyr in the renewed Roman persecution of 311, fearlessly exposing himself to danger while giving moral and material support to those in prison. At 88, he was fighting the Arian heresy, that massive trauma from which it took the Church centuries to recover. "The mule kicking over the altar" denied the divinity of Christ.

Anthony is associated in art with a T-shaped cross, a pig and a book. The pig and the cross are symbols of his valiant warfare with the devil—the cross his constant means of power over evil spirits, the pig a symbol of the devil himself. The book recalls his preference for "the book of nature" over the printed word. Anthony died in solitude at age 105.

Reflection

In an age that smiles at the notion of devils and angels, a person known for having power over evil spirits must at least make us pause. And in a day when people speak of life as a "rat race," one who devotes a whole life to solitude and prayer points to an essential of the Christian life in all ages. Anthony's hermit life reminds us of the absoluteness of our break with sin and the totality of our commitment to Christ. Even in God's good world, there is another world whose false values constantly tempt us.
