SPIRITUAL REFLECTIONS

In anticipation of the Jubilee of Families, Children, Grandparents and the Elderly, set within a yearlong celebration of hope, we remember the words of Pope Francis to families in his exhortation, Amoris Laetitia (AL): The incarnation of the Word in a human family, in Nazareth, by its very newness changed the history of the world. We need to enter into the mystery of Jesus' birth, into that "yes" given by Mary to the message of the angel, when the Word was conceived in her womb, as well as the "yes" of Joseph, who gave a name to Jesus and watched over Mary. (Amoris Laetitia, no. 65) When the Word was made flesh, the greatest gift of Hope was delivered to the human race. The story of Christ's birth is retold every year to remind us of this long-awaited gift that arrived in the form of a child. Every family experiences a similar moment of untold joy and hope with a child's arrival. The joy of love in families is rooted in hope despite the challenges and trials that life presents us. The letter of St. Paul to the Corinthians reminds us that love hopes all things. It does not despair of the future. In fact, every family is a symbol of hope for future generations.

Love, especially familial love, is rooted in the abiding promise of the Christ Child who came to renew all things and bring us everlasting peace. For this reason, despite the various trials, challenges, and sufferings--whether hidden or revealed--which every family experiences, Christian hope endures. Many families demonstrate a strong sense of calling to bear their crosses with decisive hope.

KEY SAINTS—*Holy Married Saints and Families*

- St. Joseph and the Blessed Virgin Mary (c. 1st century BC-1st century AD, multiple feast days), the earthly parents of Jesus, who together form the Holy Family and exemplify a model of family life centered on faith, love, and obedience to God's will. St. Joseph is honored for his humility and obedience as a protector and provider, while Mary, Mother of God, is revered for her perfect discipleship and love through her acceptance of God's will.
- Sts. Joachim and Anne (c. 1st century BC-1st century AD, feast day July 26), parents of the Blessed Virgin Mary and grandparents of Jesus. After years of keeping a steadfast faith and trust in God amidst the trial of infertility, Sts. Joachim and Anne received an angelic prophecy of a birth of a child, Mary, Mother of God. They are the patron saints of grandparents and infertile couples.
- Sts. Zechariah and Elizabeth (c. 1st century BC-1st century AD, feast day November 5), parents of St. John the Baptist, the forerunner of Christ. A devout elderly couple who faced infertility for many decades before God intervened, their story illustrates themes of hope, patience, and prayer.
- Sts. Aquila and Priscilla (c. 1st century, feast day July 8), a married couple and early Christian missionaries mentioned by Paul as "co-workers in Christ Jesus" (Romans 16:3). They are recognized for their hospitality, commitment to the Church, and willingness to risk their lives for the sake of the Gospel.

The Jubilee Prayer (Amended)



WHAT THE FIRST READING SAYS TO ME

The wording of this tradition on the ascension of our Lord is clearly conditioned by the limited understanding of the universe during the writer's lifetime. The wording is not part of divine revelation. There is no absolute up or down. Heaven is not a place somewhere up in outer space. Heaven is a situation outside our concepts of time and space. What the evangelists have tried to do is describe the final appearance of Jesus and/or the fact that the Lord Jesus is "sitting at God's right hand," which is a Hebrew idiom for sharing power with God.

Luke's message is: Christ has died ("after he had suffered"), Christ is risen ("he presented himself alive to them"), Christ will come again ("this Jesus will return"). That is the way we word it in our second Memorial Acclamation at Mass.

WHAT THE SECOND READING SAYS TO ME

This pericope is made up of two small passages. The first presents the ascension of Christ as a priestly act, and the second indicates the meaning of this mystery for us. The ascension is the solemn entrance into the heavenly sanctuary where the Liturgy of the Lamb is celebrated. In its wake, the entire community of believers sets out along the "new and living way" inaugurated by Christ to attain full salvation and liberation. We should make sure we are part of that company.

WHAT THE GOSPEL SAYS TO ME

In comparing the way Matthew (A), Mark (B) and Luke (C) describe the last apparition of the Lord Iesus to his disciples, we see some differences. This should not shock us. The sacred authors took existing traditions at face value, and simply used them to proclaim their message-which is that the Lord is alive, is with God, prays for us in heaven, and communicates his Spirit. This message is God's word to us, not all these details. In the tradition used by Luke, Iesus stresses penance as part of the Christian message. Notice that the disciples returned to Jerusalem "with great joy." In witnessing for Christ, we should be full of joy as well, knowing that the Lord's Spirit dwells in us.

Saint of the Day - June 5th Saint Boniface's Story

Boniface, known as the apostle of the Germans, was an English Benedictine monk who gave up being elected abbot to devote his life to the conversion of the Germanic tribes. Two characteristics stand out: his Christian orthodoxy and his fidelity to the pope of Rome.

How absolutely necessary this orthodoxy and fidelity were is borne out by the conditions Boniface found on his first missionary journey in 719 at the request of Pope Gregory II. Paganism was a way of life. What Christianity he did find had either lapsed into paganism or was mixed with error. The clergy were mainly responsible for these latter conditions since they were in many instances uneducated. questionably obedient to their bishops. In particular instances their very ordinations were questionable.

These are the conditions that Boniface was to report in 722 on his first return visit to Rome. The Holy Father instructed him to reform the German Church. The pope sent letters of recommendation to religious and civil leaders. Boniface later admitted that his work would have been unsuccessful, from a human viewpoint, without a letter of safe-conduct from Charles Martel, the powerful Frankish ruler, grandfather of Charlemagne. Boniface was finally made a regional bishop and authorized to organize the whole German Church. He was eminently successful.

In the Frankish kingdom, he met great problems because of lay interference in bishops' elections, the worldliness of the clergy and lack of papal control.

During a final mission to the Frisians, Boniface and 53 companions were massacred while he was preparing converts for confirmation.
